# Riding the Rails The GREAT STEEL FLEET 1950's, 1960's, & 1970s

My family: me, my dad, & my mom always took my dad's vacations on the train. We journeyed everywhere from the East coast westward to Chicago and south to Sanford Florida. About 40% of our travels were in the coach seats, which buy the way were very comfortable to ride and sleep in. The other 60% of the time we rode in the sleepers which had couches and seats during the day and were converted by the porter into beds (upper and lower) when we were ready to go to sleep. The sleeper also had a private bathroom. Every time the train would stop



at night I would wake up because of the loss motion and see where we were and what was going on outside. Of course one of the best things was eating in the dining car for breakfast, lunch, and dinner. There were pure white linen tablecloths and napkins. Sterling silver

"silverware" and all silver adornments on the table with NYC's special plate ware. They always filled the dinner tables so you got to meet other people from anywhere around the country, or the world. We always dressed up for train travel, as did everyone else. I never rode on the train without a suit and tie.

On one of my family's summer trips from Painesville Ohio to Sanford Florida via New York City we had just got on the train. It was just beginning night fall. I was about 6 years old at the time. We found our coach seats, sat down and got comfortable. I needed to go to the bathroom so I ventured forth to the end of our ever so long 85 foot car speeding eastward. At the time I was the only one in the bathroom and I was just washing my hands when one of the Conductors came in. He said "hello, your ticket please". Well, we had just gone over some switch tracks at that exact time which was louder inside the train. I said "pardon me" back to him. So now it was quieter again and the conductor said in a very loud, clear and masterful voice "YOUR TICKET PLEASE". Well, I jumped what felt like two feet off the floor with soapy hands! He said "sorry for startling you son". Yes, I then showed him my ticket. Both of us all smiles as we went our various ways.

A lot of the times there were as many as 17 passenger cars to the train. The public was encouraged to venture about and walk the length of the train if they pleased. One could visit the club car or the observation car if the train had one. My favorite part of that was walking between the cars because you have to time yourself just right to transverse between the two cars when the train is moving. I spent as much time as I could in the last car out on the veranda watching the tracks and the scenery traveling into the distance of our great United States of America.

#### "Those Lights" at Night on the Train

When I'm riding a train I always like to look out the window and see this great country of ours. I don't want to talk to anyone, and I don't want to read. In the daytime there's no problem. But at night there is a problem. There are two sets of lights in a passenger coach. One set is in the center of the ceiling. The others are switchable lights for each individual seat. The seat lights I have no problem with whatsoever. It's the center ceiling lights I have an issue with. Just before dusk the center ceiling lights are turned on. When darkness emerges at the end of the day the ceiling lights are kept on until 10:00pm at which time they are dimmed way down. Well with those lights on full blast there is so much glare on the windows they are like a mirror. I don't like it at all. No scenery watching until the lights are dimmed.

#### **PROTOCOL**

By the way, every time a passenger train was stopping at the station, either my dad or the ticket agent on duty (three shifts, or three tricks as they were called) would announce the train over the PA system, (say like: "Train number 43 Eastbound for Buffalo, Albany, and New York City arriving on track 2") then it was a brisk rush out to the baggage cars for loading and unloading. When I was old enough I'd say 10 years old and up to 16 years old when my Dad retired I would help him pull out the baggage carts to and from the trains. I would help hand up and receive the baggage. There was one exception – I could not touch the mail bags since I wasn't a railroad employee. The employees in the baggage car always got a kick of me helping my dad. Sometimes they'd ask me if I was going to work for the railroad when I grew up. I always answered enthusiastically "I hope so sir!".

#### **CLASS 1 RAILROADS**

We rode on seven Class 1 railroads over the years: The New York Central, the Baltimore & Ohio, the Atlantic Coast Line, the Seaboard Coast Line, the Louisville & Nashville, The Southern Railway, and the Penn Central. I myself rode on Amtrak in 2003 from Cleveland Ohio to Portland Maine via Boston's North and South

stations round trip. I took a 6 day sailing voyage on the 92 foot deck Schooner 'American Eagle' in the Atlantic Ocean off the coast of Maine. There were 22 passengers and five crew including the Caption. The boat was built in 1930 as a fishing boat and rebuilt for passengers in 1987. I've always dreamed of sailing on a schooner since I was 9 years old in 1960 and would watch the TV show 'Adventures in Paradise' starring Gardner McKay as Adam Troy as captain on the schooner 'Tiki'.

Some of the cities we stopped at and visited while riding thru the eastern half of the U.S.A. were Columbus Ohio, Cincinnati Ohio, Atlanta Georgia, Buffalo New York, Niagara falls New York, New York City New York, Boston Massachusetts, Philadelphia Pennsylvania, Washington D.C., Sanford Florida, Detroit Michigan, Cedar Point Ohio, and Chicago Illinois.

# BEST FRIENDS' on the R.R. "The 3 Musketeers"

My dad, Jim Evans and Jack Boor were best buddies, (The 3 Musketeers). Uncle Jim and Uncle Jack to me. Jim and Jack also worked at the depot in Painesville. Frequently our three family's would get together, having dinner, playing cards, or watching TV (on Saturday nights it was always 'The Lawrence Welk Show'). Sometimes my dad would play the piano, yes - a singa-long could be involved. Now... railroaders like to take a drink once and a while. My dad, Jim, and Jack drank beer (POC was a favorite, 'Pride Of Cleveland' for you youngsters), shots of whiskey, or a highball, my dad's specialty drink. Now when one drinks, sometimes a toast would appear. The guys had quite a few. I can only remember three of them. 1. "Here's hoping you live forever, & I never die". 2. "Here's to the Nickle Plate Road, the New York Central's longest siding". 3. "Here's to the New York Central Railroad". Yes, there were a lot of railroads back then and others sometimes got a toast of their own - i.e. the Santa Fe, Erie, Atlantic Cost Line, Illinois Central, Louisville & Nashville. Stop!... Yes, I could go on, but you catch my drift. Yes, those were good times.










## Railroad Memorabilia Show

#### Signals and Smoke Ham Radio Day

Join us for a fun day of Trains, Model Trains and Ham Radio on September 23, 2023 from 10 am to 4 pm at the Painesville Railroad Museum (Painesville Depot), 475 Railroad Street, Painesville, Ohio.

In the early days of railroading, communications with trains was done with telegraph using Morse Code. Train orders would be telegraph from station to station and then handed off to the trains.

Spend the day railfanning, learning how the telegraph works and see operating Ham Radio station.

The Telegraph was invented in the 1830 for long distance communications. Morse code was used via wires. As the railroads provided paths through the America's, it made since to use the railroad beds for the telegraph poles and

wires. As radio was invented, it was discovered that Morse code would transmit much farther than voice. Even today, amateur radio operators (HAM) still use Morse Code.
