PA Trolley Museum Road trip

We have been planning a road trip to the Pennsylvanian Trolley Museum in Washington, PA, which is 28 miles south of Pittsburgh, on Saturday, September 16, 2023. After investigating different tour busses, the only ones that can travel interstate, are 55 passenger busses.

So the BOD has looked into renting a 15 passenger van and drive ourselves.

The Van cost is \$387 for the weekend plus gas. It is about 160 miles each way, and at 18 miles/gallon we would use about 18 gals of gas at \$3.60/ gal = \$65

387 + 65 = 452 divided by 15 = 30.13 each

Admission to museum = \$12.00 (\$11.00 for seniors)

This would cost each person going a minimum of <u>42.13 each + lunch</u>. This is based on 15 people going.

As a kid I was there at the depot quite a bit. I was born in 1951. For a while throughout the late 1940's and the 1950's my dad worked at the NYC Vine Street Tower in Willoughby Ohio oper-

ating the RR crossing gates and switches, before the underpass was put in in 1960 and 1961. remember all



the Railroad workers working at the depot were always in a good mood and had a smile on their faces for me as they went about their jobs. To me, they were all my family. Many times through the years some of them would come over to our house on Second Street in Willoughby and play cards, have dinner and drinks, or have a picnic in the back yard. We (railroaders) were a close knit community. My Dad had me address each of

them as either Aunt or Uncle, i.e. Uncle Jack, Aunt Vie, Aunt Helen, Uncle Floyd & so on. Yes, My dad, 'Walter Dickinson Gifford Sr.' started to those names are real railroad people. World War 2 at the height of traffic on the NYC there were 200 trains a day! Buy the way that averages out to one train every 7 minutes and 20 seconds in a 24 hour period. Yes, my Dad was hard of hearing when he retired. On the north side of the "main" or "high iron" the freight depot had a five switch tracks in the freight yard that went all the way to Storrs Street. There is still one track there. There were always RR cars and a caboose or two coming and going. There was always one engine used for moving the ever changing freight cars around, usually an F7,


CSX Replacing Ties on Track 2
